Around the Club

ESQUIMALT HARBOUR - MARINE BLASTING - 01 DEC 18 - 15 FEB 2019

Marine drilling and blasting will occur in the B jetty area on:

01 DEC 18-15 FEB 19

First blast is not expected until approx 11 DEC with 1 to 2 blasts per week for December. This may increase to 2 to 3 times a week in JAN and FEB 19.

Blasts will be preceded by 12 short blasts on an air horn and the all clear will be 1 prolonged blast

Ships will be contacted daily when blasting will occur. Although a time may be set, there are a number of conditions that must be met before a blast can occur. If any of these conditions are not met then the blast will be delayed. Delays can be 30 minutes or longer

All small boats are to give the A₃/B jetty/C₁ jetty a wide berth and minimum wake when crossing and are not permitted to enter the waters between A₃ and C₁ jetty without the express permission of QHM Operations.

Swimming and diving operations are not permitted during blast times in Esquimalt harbour. Units planning any exercise involving divers/swimmers are to ensure clearance is given by QHM Operations

Personnel are not permitted to enter contractor work areas which are surrounded by yellow fencing, without the permission of the contractor. POC:

There was a whaler race every New Year's Day at the "Royal Canadian Navy Sailing Association" RCNSA Halifax N.S. It was mighty cold in January, sailors! Most of the Navy ships and bases competed. The local yacht clubs were challenged to participate. Weather conditions were often so brutal so that sailors sometimes had to peal encrusted salt off their faces!

Dave Gasser (joined RCNSA in 1954) raced whalers in Halifax and when he and his family moved back to balmy Victoria 1967 he was very surprised to note there were no New Year's Day whaler races at the club in Esquimalt, now called CFSA. Dave and the executive started the Esquimalt whaler races the following year. The ships, in port, sent whalers and crews to our club. Others could join in the fun and the competition was fierce.

They also named the club newsletters "The Whaler" and published a Club Annual every year. Jim and Betty Tyre, John Pirquet, Judy Dennett and many others were the hard working volunteer publishers.

The two-masted whalers were sadly not fitted on the newer naval frigates.

There are crazy rules and bun fights, sailing backwards, sailing with a blindfold on (tough on Pat Nicholson, the single handler) and many funny tricks to try. The prize giving is a hoot and sure gets you laughing. Not to be missed. Take it all in next New Year's Day 2020.


